TEXAS HEROES

JOHN GREGG**1828 – 1864**

John Gregg, a native of Lawrence County, Alabama, was born September 28, 1828. He moved to La Grange, Alabama as a boy where he received his education at La Grange College, after which he studied law at Tuscumbia. After emigrating to Fairfield, Texas, in 1852, he was elected district judge in 1856. Gregg was a member of the secession convention in 1861, and to the Provisional Confederate Congress the same year.

Gregg resigned his seat after First Manassas, he returned to Texas and recruited the 7th Texas Infantry of which he was elected colonel. He and his regiment were surrendered and exchanged at Fort Donelson. The following February he was promoted brigadier general to rank from August 29, 1862. He was assigned to the division of John Bell Hood, Longstreet's corps, and his brigade was a part of the very successful "wedge" driven into the Federal line at Chickamauga. Gregg was severely wounded in this engagement. After his recovery and the return of his unit to the Army of Northern Virginia, he was assigned to command of the Texas brigade which he led with conspicuous bravery at the Wilderness and during the ensuing Overland campaign of 1864. He was killed in action on the Charles City Road below Richmond on the morning of October 7, 1864. He is

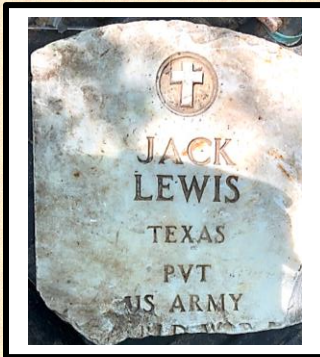

TAKING A FELLOW BACK HOME

While visiting Bryan Cemetery sexton Robert Jackson a few days ago, I noticed a partial VA headstone for Jack Lewis in the bed of Robert's pickup. I enquired as to how he came to possess it and the reply was that 'someone had found it

under a house in north Bryan' and had given it to him. It had been in his truck for several months and he was at a loss as to how to find its home location. I told him I thought I could help him; promptly took a photo; forwarded it to Baldwin Chapter 312 Commander Lee Lance, an electronic genealogist extraordinaire; and, followed up with a call to Lee. Within a few minutes, Lee had found Mr. Lewis' military service papers and death certificate. Lewis' death certificate noted his burial site as the Bryan Colored Cemetery; however, the issue was that there are at least three black cemeteries in Bryan. Unfortunately, we didn't know which of them would have been referenced as such in 1957.

Late in the day, Lee sent me an email with images of the documents he had found. I then contacted Chapter 312 Adjutant Henry Mayo, who is also the Brazos County Historical Society President, and inquired if he could help identify which might be the correct cemetery. Henry then forwarded the info to several folks in his group and, by the next morning, Bill Paige had located Lewis' Veterans Administration Application for Headstone form. The form had been completed by Mr. Lewis' wife and the burial location was listed as Brushy Cemetery overseen by the Daniel Funeral Home of Bryan. We are coordinating with the current Daniel & Son

Funeral Home to discover any further information that might be had regarding his exact internment plot within the cemetery.

The Brushy Community is a loosely organized black community west of the TAMU campus near the Brazos River. It was historically associated with the pre-Texas Revolution Jones family's Mexican land grant/plantation. [Note: Mr Lewis' WWI Draft Card shows his employer to be L S Jones and his job as Farmer] The cemetery is heavily overgrown, closed, and on private property. A group of us are planning an expedition to see if we can locate the bottom portion of the headstone. In the meantime, we will be requesting a granite replacement marker for World War I Veteran, Private Frank Lewis, Co C, 341st Labor Battalion, Quartermaster Corps, US Army. We hope to "take this fellow home" and have his gravesite properly marked for his descendants in the very near future.

The following is an excerpt from *The Texas Republican* (Marshall, TX) 17 Aug. 1861, pg 2.

“Will Such a People Prosper?—We have heard through the Northern papers of the grand swindling of their regiments in the way of worthless uniforms, shoes pasted together, and hats that melted off in the first rain; but the following discloses a fact almost too low and blasphemous to gain our credence. Yet, from the high source it emanates [sic.], we presume it is true.

The Army Committee of the New York Young men's Christian Association have presented a memorial to the Secretary of War, in which they call his attention to the fact “that, contrary to the order respecting chaplains, requiring that they should be regularly organized clergymen of some Christian denomination, there are persons of other occupations, such as bankers, editors, and play-actors occupying positions as chaplains in some of the regiments.

“We have reason to believe not only that those persons have no true ministerial standing, but they are destitute of that

positive religious character which is essential to the usefulness of a chaplain, and the spiritual welfare of the soldiers.”

On this the Central Presbyterian, of Richmond, says: “The Yankees surely exercise their ingenuity in every possible way, when they even steal the livery of Heaven to serve the Devil in.”—Nashville Banner of Peace”

May we be ever vigilant in spiritual and temporal matters to avoid charlatans, hucksters, and frauds who desire to divert our relationship with the Lord and to destroy our Southern Heritage.

May the Lord watch over and keep you safe in these troubled times.

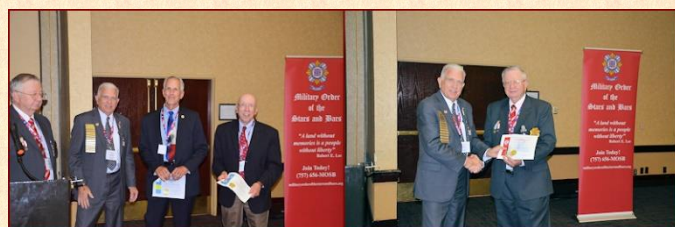
