Remember the Scars

The Confederate soldiers went back to what was left of their homes, defeated and often dejected. Out of the brokenness of their lives, came strength and evidence of God's power in their lives which was expressed in the humilities of rebuilding their lives, their homes, and extending themselves in many countless ways only known to God. Included in my chaplain's article this month is a very touching story given to me by Gary Loudermilk by way of Steve Von Roeder. Each of us has our spiritual and emotional scars we live with. Imagine the physical and emotional scars our confederate ancestors lived with as each came home to attempt to rebuild our Southern homeland. Each of us is living proofs of the exceptional character of these men we revere.

Remember the Scars

John Gordon was a respected general for the South in the Civil War. After the war, he was running for the United States Senate. But a man, who served under him in the war, angry over some political incident, was determined to see him defeated. Everyone knew this man would fight Gordon's bid to become a senator.

During the convention, he angrily stamped down the aisle with his anti-Gordon vote in hand. As he saw Gordon sitting on the platform, he noticed how his once handsome face was disfigured with the scars of battle-marks of his willingness to suffer and bleed for a cause he believed in.

The old soldier was stricken with remorse. Overcome with emotion, he exclaimed, "It's no use, I can't do it. Here's my vote for John Gordon." Then, turning to the general, he said, "Forgive me, General. I had forgotten the scars." What a difference it makes in our lives when we remember the scars! With so many things to distract us, we don't often take time each day to reflect on what Jesus went through on the cross for us. But, when we are tempted to stray, it is a remembrance of Christ's sacrifice that has the power to draw us back to Him.

Imagine having your MOS&B Chapter meeting an entire day's drive away! Out here in West Texas we are the most western chapter in the State of Texas. Our members hail from Menard, Christoval, Sheffield, Midland, Lubbock, Arlington, Houston, Gatesville, Comanche, Brownwood, and San Angelo. If you make the drive connecting all these sites, you're looking at 1,357 straight line miles.

Chapter 310 chartered in 2018 and has been an awardwinning chapter every year. Our members meet quarterly and participate in a large number of activities throughout the year. We provide a firing line for the DAR's Memorial Day program and the City of San Angelo's Veterans Day ceremonies at Fairmount Cemetery. Our members are participants in the local San Jacinto Battle Veterans Memorial, the Confederate Memorial Day program, and the annual Christmas at Old Fort Concho / Winter Rendezvous. Additionally, we participate in the annual Genealogy Fair and many of our members have been appointed to the Tom Green County Historic Honor Guard by the Commissioners Court. We are honored to present the colors at many local events. We are proud to report Chapter 310 is a recipient of the Texas Society's 2023 Gold Star Chapter Award, the MOS&B Outstanding Chapter Award, and is a 100% Retention Award recipient for the second straight year.

Our members have participated in restoration and repairs of historical markers on the courthouse lawn and other sites. Most recently a large delegation travelled to the small town of Christoval south of San Angelo where we rededicated a grey granite monument honoring the Confederate Reunion Grounds at Christoval. A history of the United Confederate Veteran camps and the thirtyplus years of reunions was presented. Following the site tour, we retreated from the 100+ degree heat to our business meeting at a local BBQ. Commander McMahon presented Texas Society service certificates to 15 members for a total of 205-years membership. We will offer in person and combined Zoom meetings in the near future for our members more than 4-hours away.

What Was The Motto of the Confederacy



'**Dgo vindicg**' at the base of the seal was the Confederate motto, loosely translated as 'God is our vindicator'.

Lt. Colonel Isacc E. Avery

On July 3, 1863, 34 year old Lt. Colonel Isaac E. Avery of the 6th North Carolina State Troops died from mortal wounds received the previous day. Shot in the neck and partially paralyzed during the Battle of Gettysburg, he was unable to speak.

Colonel Avery fell while leading his men in an attack on Cemetery Hill. Avery had taken command of Colonel Robert F. Hoke's 21st North Carolina Infantry Regiment after Col. Hoke was himself wounded at Chancellorsville. Colonel Avery was actually leading both the 6th and the 21st. (My Great Great Grandfather King David Whitaker was in the 21st and was in this charge up Cemetery Hill).

Colonel Avery was the only one fighting on horseback when he was shot and he had to be carried from the field. Clutched in his hand was a small bloodstained piece of paper. Though right-handed, he was forced to write with his left hand. His letter said, "Major, tell my father that I died with my face to the enemy." This famous letter has become known as the letter from the dead.

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
